### OUR VISION

Members, friends, and family of Grace, as I catch my breath from the whirlwind past few months, I'd like to share updates with you from the two national events I attended in July.

#### THE LCMS YOUTH GATHERING - www.lcmsgathering.com - July 11-15, Minneapolis, MN

Our Real. Present. God. provided a memorable youth gathering experience. Final attendance totals included 22,000 youth and 5,610 adult leaders representing 1,537 congregations, plus over 1,000 adult volunteers. As attendance at the gathering is not limited to LCMS youth, there were several youth there

who are not yet Christian, coming as friends of youth groups. God uses this gathering every year to bring people into relationship with Him. In fact, there were four youth baptisms over the course of the weekend. Alleluia!

Youth began the day with Bible study, then chose from dozens of smaller Gathering sessions including such topics as: "Who Actually Cares about Jesus? My Friends Don't." "Why is It SO Hard to Read and Understand the Bible?" and "From Gay Bars to Jesus: A clear voice in a gender confused generation." There were also sessions intended for leaders, like "Ministering to Youth in Crisis... without a counseling degree."

Youth and leaders participated in service projects as well. Among the highlights: 463 units of blood and 926 inches of hair donated, 1,013 kits built for the homeless, 574 encouraging letters written to veterans, and – get ready for this – 1,003,014 meals packed to be used by *Feed My Starving Children*!

Each evening, everyone gathered together under one roof – the giant US Bank Stadium roof – for the Mass Event. My primary responsibility was security/safety for this event, along with a team of about 10 other military, law enforcement, and medical personnel. At the Mass Event, youth were shown, through personal testimony, drama, and song, the love of Jesus and the restoration and forgiveness that He brings, no matter how messed up our lives become. Mass Events did not shy away from difficult topics but spoke to youth where they are, through the eyes of Jesus. Hope shines into hopelessness and God gives His peace beyond understanding. 
#### THE 67th LCMS CONVENTION - www.lcms.org/convention - July 20-25, Tampa, FL

I move that I now write about the LCMS Convention. Is there any discussion? (Microphone queue immediately fills up with 100 people.) I call the question.

That's a decent summary of the LCMS Convention. While you can find out much more about the hundreds

of resolutions and elections which took place by following the link above, I'd like to share some insights as well as some of the resolutions which may be deemed more important.

The first and foremost insight I have is in comparing our convention to that of other church bodies. You may have heard in the news about other recent church body conventions descending into shouting matches, or where delegates were split by whether or not to follow Scripture – or even where they voted to reject the word of God in favor of the philosophy of man. Such is NOT the case in the LCMS! Delegates were highly unified on the central place of Scripture, and votes to affirm Biblical positions on issues such as life and marriage were nearly unanimous, with >95% of the vote. Praise God!



Regarding synodical elections, again

this year it seemed that a rubber stamp was placed on the "United List" – a list of "preferred" candidates produced by an ultraconservative pastor and distributed in advance of the election. Virtually all elected candidates are from this list across the entire Synod. I attribute this to apathy – those who are not enthralled with Synod politics tend to stay away from it. This has the side effect of leaving only one point of view elected to Synod. I would prefer to see others involved, even if they have better things to do than worry about Synod business. (Including our congregation, which has been distant from all Synod affairs!)

Among many resolutions passed, please note the following:

- R 5-09A reaffirms the Biblical teaching that God created the world in six regular days.
- R 4-11A encourages our congregations and workers to study the doctrine and practice of Closed Communion, which we have all agreed to follow. There are concerns that some congregations are too loose in their practice.
- R 5-10 commends for study a Lutheran Church-Canada paper on Cremation.
- R 2-07 sets Synod as the only-sending mission agency. Our Eastern District passed a resolution against this last year.
- Note that R 10-03A dealing with Ecclesiastical Supervision was not passed. This continues to allow the Synod President to step in, over the District President, when the Synod President believes the District President has not acted in a particular situation. The Eastern District also spoke against this practice in our convention.

The National Offering was received for ministry work in the LCMS and totaled \$331,737.22.



#### Imagine ... going back in time

and across the ocean to meet St. Paul. At this year's *Athens* Vacation Bible School (VBS), that's what we did!

Nearly 40 children not only heard of Paul's adventures elsewhere (like an earthquake that freed him from prison!), they got to experience an adventure when escaping a



crowd who came to find Paul and bring him before the city's council! Paul stayed true to his central message: God loves everyone and wants them to know His Son, Jesus.

Our VBS guests got to meet Dionysius (a respected member of the Council of Athens), a friend of Paul who thought Paul was foolish at the beginning of the week, and by the end saw the Truth and became a believer!

At VBS, children travelled in Oikos (the Greek word for "household") to visit Paul, play Olympic-inspired games, and visit the marketplace. Each night, we sent them home excited, tired, and inspired with the message that **God loves us all!** (to which they would respond, "It's true!").

The marketplace was a unique feature this year. The children got to visit shopkeepers who set up their stores to sell their wares. The children visited the Food Market each night for refreshments. Throughout the week, their other choices included a Music Shop, a Pottery Studio, an Olympic Shop, a Scribe Shop and an Animal Courtyard (with live animals!). You can imagine the fun they had!

Each evening, the children were engaged when they were given a mission in the marketplace. They had missions like "Introduce yourself to the Shopkeeper", "Invite the Shopkeeper to closing", and "Thank the Shopkeeper for letting you visit". The shopkeepers (who pretended to be genuine, polytheistic Athenians) challenged the kids, too, with questions about Paul and "this Jesus person". The kids did a great job insisting that there is *one true* God who loves us all through Jesus!

God blessed us with an adventure-filled, love-inspiring, Gospel-declaring week! *Thank you* to the many people who made it all possible!

It takes about **400** volunteer hours to put on Vacation Bible School for our community. That's a lot of dedication from our precious team!

VBS guests brought over **200** school supplies, socks and underwear for Harry Abate Elementary School students. They love making a difference!

Over 3/5 of the **39** kids we had at VBS do not attend church regularly – anywhere. This is a wonderful opportunity for them – and their families – to hear about how much God loves them, and what He did about it through Jesus. Praise God for bringing them through our doors!

We had **25** *known* people who supported VBS without being at the event itself! Through prayer, monetary support, decoration and costume making, clean up before and after, and in many other ways, our congregation brought the Gospel to our community.

In addition, **27** VBS staff were in attendance at the event throughout the week. From our registration to our own St. Paul and his Greek friend Dionysius, people filled vital roles to make the program impactful to the kids!

It will be given to a child in need as determined by the teachers at Harry Abate.

<u>PLEASE NOTE</u>: Several of the school supply lists request ear buds or ear phones. Hint--there are nice models available for \$5 or less at Five Below, located in the strip plaza of the Walmart shopping complex. You may be able to find them even cheaper than \$5 if you watch the sales.

SOCKS & UNDERWEAR: Our inner city children are also in need of socks and underwear for the coming school year. While these items are taken for granted by most of us, they are considered a luxury by families that are struggling to provide the basics needed for everyday life. And statistics show that almost half the children in Niagara Falls live in families with incomes close to or below the poverty level. Grace members have given generously to this annual mission project for several years, and our school nurses have come to depend on us as partners as they try to provide for the dignity of the children in their care. Boxes are available in the chapel and narthex to accept your gifts. Thank you for your help.

#### **Balancing Priorities**

In economic thought, the 'opportunity cost' of making decisions connects to planned benefits received. This is different than giving up something for preferences we choose. God tells us through the Apostle Paul in his epistle to the Galatians 6:7, "Do not be deceived: God is not mocked, for whatever one sows that will he also reap."

When people make determinations related to use of time, allocation of money or development of ability, they typically match choices with the driving motivations of behavior. Balancing priorities is not only driven by personal characteristics, but by the importance placed on desired outcomes.

It's true that hardwired personality traits that make up psychological and social tendencies, paired with parental influence, along with Spiritual guidance, determine most of the inclinations that motivate us on how we approach life's decisions. Today, options are available for unprecedented selection.

Beyond mere psychology, we understand our battle with our sinful flesh, recognizing our need to repent of inappropriate allocations. Only God's grace in Christ can sort through the chaos of our poor decisions. We replace harmony with our Father for temptations to be like God, which brings disharmony. This reality is most obvious in how we often fail to keep God as first among earthly priorities and how life's priorities blur our vision of our Father's. We fail to balance decisions in faithfulness to the Giver of all good things.

Grace has forgiven our failures through the cross, and Christ's Spirit comforts and empowers us to realign priorities to reflect the primary purpose of life; to honor God first and share His kingdom on earth.

Including a witness to faith and support for the Lord's work in these plans, we validate our priority's balance to honor God, who Created, Redeemed and Sustains our lives, even as we desire to bless our children and our children's children.
